Last week we discussed setting up a successful morning routine that ensures that you are leaving home on time.

We discussed: > Planning – you have preplanned outfits and things that you will need,

Morning Routines and How to Leave the House on Time - Part 2

Preparation- prepared your child by having a clear discussion of what 'being ready' means (not just putting on their clothes but brushing their teeth too!),

> Making sure you start you morning routine early enough to ensure you are not rushing - remembering that building independence takes time and practice.

How to ensure success: I would begin to practice at the weekend or during a holiday rather than implementing a big change to the morning when children return back to school. Going back to school can be stressful enough for children, you don't want to add a new morning routine too! Children can also help their parents by learning to be independent, such as getting dressed and brushing their teeth. This gives the child the opportunity to practice those skills and teaches them how to prepare properly. Besides, it saves your time!



You may want to try a game like "Ready on Time". The goal of the child is to be ready before the alarm goes off. When you have a child, you can get a small reward such as putting your favorite snack in the lunch box.
