We have been using the platform for almost a year now and during that time, it has become an essential tool in our teaching toolkit. Before we began using the app, Mr. Citrano and I hoped that the use of Seesaw would enable children to make their learning progress more visible for parents and provide them with a way to record their learning over time. I am pleased to say that the use of Seesaw has

helped us to meet that goal and more.

Impressively, each week there are approximately 800 items posted, 1000 pieces of feedback shared by teachers, children and parents, and 1000 visits to children's journals by parents. This amazing level of engagement really supports our children's developing self-esteem and pride in their work. The constructive feedback given supports their growth as learners. I am sure you look forward to seeing your child's new Seesaw posts and we aim to make sure that every child has at least two new items in their journal each week. The environmental impact has also been pleasing as we are using a lot less paper these days.

Furthermore, we have been satisfied with the use of Seesaw as an effective communication tool between teachers, parents and children. When I was teaching in G6G, I valued the use of Seesaw as a communication tool and I did not miss the use of the old communication books at all. I hope you too are enjoying the ease of communication that Seesaw enables with your child's teachers.
