Innovative Bilingual Education for an Ever-Changing World



#### From Mr. Anthony Hall, Deputy Head of School



Greetings from MIS. This week, I have the pleasure of celebrating a wonderful example of the academic success of our students. In February 2024, students from Grades 3 to 5 participated in the International Schools' Assessment (ISA), a programme developed by the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) and designed specifically for international schools. The test provides MIS with a way to compare the academic performance of our students with other international school students. What follows are facts about the test:

Over 40,000 students took the tests at 159 international schools in 49 countries.

5,164 students took the Grade 3 test; 5,092 took the G4 test; 6,260 took the G5 test.

For purposes of making comparisons, schools are grouped according to their majority home language. MIS was listed as a Group 2 school. Group 2 schools have between 16% and 35% of their pupils whose native language at home is English.

When looking at the overall results, the MIS school community can be greatly reassured that our students' achievements compare very well to all other groups. In most subjects, MIS averages are above the averages of other Group 2 schools. In most subjects, the MIS results are better than the Asian pacific schools' averages and the All Schools' averages. You can see these results in the chart below. Well done to the students, they deserve great credit. The past couple of weeks the Grade 1 students have been learning about instructions. The students wrote instructions on how to brush their teeth, 'How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth', and followed different instructions to make hand print birds, fold origami, and create people chains.

#### Grade 2 Explore, Observe & Sketch Japanese Gardens

On Thursday, May 23rd, the Grade 2 students enjoyed a field trip to Mihama En Garden. They walked to the traditional Japanese garden, where they immersed themselves in nature's beauty. As part of their ongoing unit on plants, they explored the garden, observed different plant species, and sketched some of the beautiful scenes. This experience helped to foster an appreciation and understanding of the plants around us.



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#### **Grade 3 Bring Sunshine to the School**

Grade 3 have started growing mini sunflowers right outside the classroom. Each student planted their own sunflower seed and is responsible for tracking it as it grows. The class is tracking the progress of their sunflowers week by week, recording observations, and learning about the life cycle of plants. This hands-on project is not only teaching them about nature, but providing them with hands on experience collecting data, drawing models, and writing observations.

#### **Grade 4 Practice Mixing Different Tones and Temperatures**

To prepare for their still-life painting project, students in Grade 4 practiced painting different tones of colours, including bright spots and dark shadows. They learned that they could achieve these effects by mixing in white or black. The Grade 4s also learned about temperature - how to make a colour warmer by adding yellow or cooler by adding blue. The final results turned out to be quite satisfying!





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#### Grade 5 Explore the History and Nature of Local Sawara

This month Grade 5 students went on a field trip to Sawara. The day was filled with adventure and learning, starting with a scenic boat ride on the Ono River. The students marveled at the town's historic buildings and picturesque views. As part of their river study in science, they sketched the flood wall defenses along the riverbanks, gaining a hands-on understanding of how these structures help prevent flooding. This trip combined practical science education with real-world observations, making the concepts of hydrology and civil engineering come alive. It was a memorable day that deepened their appreciation for both environmental conservation and historical preservation.



#### Grade 6 Practice the Lifelong Skill of Sewing

In Grade 6 Green, the students have been learning how to sew using different techniques and methods. They have created patterns, designs, and explored different materials. Students have made cushions, which they designed and made individually. Students have learned how to sew by hand using a needle and thread and also using a sewing machine. Students can now thread the sewing machine by themselves and use the machine safely, effectively, and efficiently.

#### Grade 6 Make Their Own Pillow Book

The students in Grade 6 have been studying an essay written over a thousand years ago during the Heian period. The children found themselves relating to what Sei Shonagon felt. Students used some old words and wrote their own original version of 'The Pillow Book'.



#### **Grade 1 Farmers Tend to their Big Big Turnips**

The students in Grade 1 planted turnip seeds this month. In less than a week, the seeds sprouted. G1 waters them everyday and takes good care of them. We can't wait to see them grow into a big, big turnip!
