Key Vocabulary

In this unit children will have an opportunity to use a range of words and phrases, such as:

- Jump, land, rock, roll, grip, hang, push, pull, bounce, hop, skip, step, spring, crawl, slide
- Words to describe speed, e.g. stop, still, slowly
- Shape, e.g. tall, long, wide, narrow
- Direction, e.g. up, down, forwards
- Level, e.g. high, low
- Pathway, e.g. zigzag, straight
- Body parts and surfaces, e.g. feet, hands, toes, heels, knees, head, elbows, bottom, back, tummies
- Along, around, across, on, off, over, under, through
- Tension, extension, relaxation
